## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

The summer school program enables students to enrich their learning, make up failed courses, or take courses that are not available during the school term. Registration for all academic classes and driver education must be done in person at Westside High School prior to June 1. Office hours are 7:00 am - 4:00 pm.

### **I. Grades:**

All grades (except for driver education) will be in Power School. Parents and students will be able to access their personal accounts after receiving their passwords on Monday, June 4. Parents and students are encouraged to check Power School on a regular basis. Final grades will be mailed on or about July 14, but parents and students can go on-line by June 27 to see final grades. Grades for students from other districts will be sent automatically as per the directions given on the summer school registration form.

### **II. Attendance:**

Attendance is critical. Substantial work is completed each day. Students may not have more than **THREE** absences - unexcused or excused. If a **FOURTH** absence occurs, the student will be dropped from the class with an F grade.

**Students who are more than 10 minutes late to class will be counted unexcused.**

After the first and second absence, the parent will be notified by the teacher. Once a student reaches three absences, the teacher will notify the Summer School Administrator who will then call the parents to forewarn them that the student will be dropped from summer school upon a fourth absence. If this occurs, no credit or refund will be given. Refusal to do work during class may also result in an unexcused absence. Students referred to the deans' office during class will be counted absent for that class.

**Tardiness -- 3 Tardies = 1 unexcused.** Students are expected to be in class on time. This applies to returning from class breaks also. For each three tardies, one unexcused absence will result. Refusal to work during class may also result in an absence.

**Students dropped from a class will receive a failing (F) grade that will be recorded on their transcript.**

III. **Student Conduct:**

Students attending summer school are expected to be responsible learners and citizens. Instances of irresponsibility that will warrant immediate withdrawal from summer school with no credit or refund are:

- \* Possession of, selling of, or use of intoxicating liquor, drugs, and/or narcotics
- \* Fighting
- \* Gambling
- \* Destruction of school property
- \* Gross disrespect for teachers, school officials, or other employees
- \* Behavior that seriously interferes with class work
- \* Knowingly possessing or handling a weapon
- \* Willfully damaging property of others
- \* Using violence or threats
- \* Disregard for summer school policies

IV. **Parking:**

Student parking will be in the **West** parking lot (off 89th and Pacific Streets.)

**Tobacco** -- Use or possession of any form of tobacco is prohibited on school property including all forms of vaping devices. This includes parking lots. On the first offense parents will be notified. On the second offense, the student will be **dropped** from summer school with no credit or refund granted.

**Student Dress** -- Students are expected to follow the school year dress code during summer school. Bathing suits or any attire that causes distraction in the classroom will not be permitted. Students must wear shoes at all times. Students will **not** be permitted to wear caps. Also, clothing that promotes alcohol or drugs will not be allowed.

**When Not In Class** -- Students who are not in class should not be in the building.

**Unauthorized Areas** -- Students should not be in unoccupied classrooms or parts of the building not in the area of their regular classes.

**Food** -- Teachers may exercise their judgment on allowing food in class. Students are not to have open containers in the halls and are responsible for throwing their trash away. The concession stand near the baseball field may be open during the summer school hours.

**Lunch** -- Lunch will be served daily in the courtyard from 11 until 11:25. Lunch will be \$3.40. Free/reduced lunch pricing will apply. Students are expected to consume lunches in the courtyard.

Students are offered a Driver Education course through Educational Service Unit #3. Students are required to complete 20 hours of classroom instruction and driving lessons leading to the successful passing of the DMV approved road test. Driver Education includes (1) basic defensive driving, skills and safety procedures, (2) study and applications of rules and regulations that affect our driving. This course is graded and requires a learners permit before behind the wheel driving lessons are given. Driving arrangements are made with the instructor allowing flexibility in scheduling. All students must pass all written tests and the DMV certified road test to obtain a waiver for Provisional Operator Permit.

# MATHEMATICS

The summer school mathematics curriculum is designed for those students who need to recover credits that were not earned during the previous school year. This program is not designed for students attempting to accelerate through an entire year of mathematics.

The curriculum is self-paced with teacher intervention, as needed. Students will receive an outline of the coursework with recommended completion dates for each unit. All students should expect to work on assignments outside of class throughout the duration of summer school.

To recover credit for the course students must successfully complete daily assignments, chapter assessments, and proficiencies, and final exam.

NO extensions of time will be given for any reason.

## *ALGEBRA JUMPSTART*

Algebra Jumpstart will focus on the algebra and number sense state standards, providing additional instruction with pre-algebra concepts prior to taking a high school mathematics course. This course is ideal for students entering Algebra 1 who may have struggled with math previously and/or have been recommended for Algebra 1A and would like the opportunity to take Algebra 1 at the beginning of the year.

Prospective students will need a teacher and/or counselor recommendation from the middle school for admission to this course. 8th grade teachers writing recommendations would consider academic grades in math 8, NWEA MAP RIT scores between 215 and 230 in grade 8, and/or course recommendations for grade 9.

## *GENERAL PHYSICAL EDUCATION*

This course is designed to give students basic information regarding a variety of sports. Students will learn to play volleyball, basketball, ultimate Frisbee, flag football, kickball, softball, and tennis. Additionally, students will work on improving their cardiovascular fitness level, muscle strength and endurance, and study how to improve nutritional habits.

The daily class will consist of a workout designed to elevate the heart rate, complete muscle-toning exercises, and then the students will begin to work on a designated sport. Students will be given instruction on basic rules of the game, techniques, and be given time to practice the concepts taught that day. Students will be expected to be active for the entire 3 hour block.

Students are expected to dress appropriately for the class. Athletic shoes and workout clothes are **REQUIRED**. No tank tops or sandals may be worn for the class.

# SCIENCE

## *BIOLOGY*

## *EARTH AND SPACE SCIENCE ONLINE*

The online course content is the same as Earth and Space Science and can be taken in place of Earth and Space Science. Students cannot have previously taken this course and failed. This class is structured with the student working independently to complete work and prepare for assessments. Students are expected to attend class everyday. Students learn from Blackboard resources as well as specific laboratory activities that must be completed at school. An instructor is available during class time as well as via e-mail to address concerns or questions. All assessments will be taken under the supervision of the instructor.

A student who signs up for this should be a self-starter and plan on working independently towards meeting course outcomes. In addition, students who enroll in this course should be comfortable asking for help and communicating one-on-one with a teacher.

**NOTE:** This course fulfills the prerequisite for Physics. Students are encouraged to take the course before taking Physics. Students and parents will be required to sign a contract pertaining to meeting required due dates as part of the registration process. Limit 12 students per session.

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# **SOCIAL STUDIES**

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## ***AMERICAN GOVERNMENT***

This course will focus on the contemporary nature and function of the American political system. The units will cover the following areas: (1) summarizing the basic framework of American political values and traditions (2) examining the structure of the levels of government (3) analyzing various links between people and the government including public opinion, political parties, interest groups, voting & media and (4) examining our judicial system with special attention on rights, police, courts, and prisons.  
Limited to 18 students per session.

## ***GLOBAL GEOGRAPHY***

This course introduces students to basic geographic concepts and skills. These concepts include: 1) the five themes of geography, 2) physical geography, 3) global culture regions, 4) urban geography, and 5) environment issues. Improving study skills, reading and designing of maps, charts, problem solving, and team work will be major focuses of the curriculum. The primary object is to challenge students to investigate the world beyond their immediate environment.

## *THE AMERICAN PRESIDENCY*

This course will explore the role of the U. S. Presidency throughout American history. Students will analyze both primary and secondary sources to explain their knowledge of the United States' executive branch. The class will focus on the founding fathers' vision for the presidency and how historical events have altered that vision. The course will engage students through classroom discussion, debate, and teamwork projects. Special attention will be given to those presidents who have significantly altered the course of American history.

Limited to 18 students per session.

## *UNITED STATES HISTORY (1ST & 2ND SEMESTERS)*

This course is designed to enable students to complete their U.S. History graduation requirement. Individualized instruction is emphasized in working with each student according to his/her interests, needs and abilities. Students may choose either first or second semester U.S. History credit.

## *U.S. HISTORY THROUGH HOLLYWOOD*

Like written history, contemporary Hollywood feature films are an interpretation of their society. A major goal of this course is determining what is valid in contemporary films and historical dramas and what do these films say about the people who created them, the politics behind their creation, and how they reflect the values, ideas, and larger historical issues of the time in which they were created.

Therefore, this course examines Hollywood feature films and historical dramas as historical evidence. Students will view movies on various topics and time periods, participate in graded-discussions, and write essays comparing the film evidence to information in more traditional sources, such as articles, film reviews, and critical commentaries.
